We must move immediately to protect our communities from crime. I am a retired peace officer and Commissioner for the County Probation Department. I am concerned about crime and justice. Our corrections system has failed us since the implementation of AB109, Prison Realignment. It has been more like "Mal-alignment." Liberals in state government and the Legislature have failed to see the harm they have done. The result has been that tens of thousands of convicts have been released early. In many cases convicts have not served their full sentences. Justice has been compromised and as criminals often do when released, they return to a life of crime. At the center of this issue is prison overcrowding. Here's an answer; Build More Prisons! Let's not warehouse prisoners but think about smart prisons that provide an opportunity to earn a marketable skill and rehabilitation and treatment to those who qualify. We must stop shifting the burden of incarceration to counties that are ill-equipped to handle the load of incarceration and supervision.

Citizens should expect nothing less than a representative who works in their greater interest. I will consider the impact of each piece of legislation to determine how it will affect taxpayers, our economy, public safety and it meets a high standard of fiscal responsibility. I will put forward legislation that promotes life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness for all Californians.
